Candidacy for the Elahé Omidyar Mir-Djalali Postdoctoral Fellowship in Iranian Studies 2025-2026.

I recently graduated *cum laude* with a PhD in Asian and African Studies from Ca' Foscari University of Venice, where I wrote a dissertation on the reception of the *sāqināme* in Persian literature. My research highlighted the pivotal role that Turcographic literary circles played in the emergence of the *sāqināme* as a distinct genre.

By applying for the Elahé Omidyar Mir-Djalali Postdoctoral Fellowship in Iranian Studies, I seek to further develop and substantiate the hypotheses advanced in my doctoral work, broaden the scope of my research, and consolidate it into a monograph that I hope will make a lasting contribution to the field of Persographic literature. The fellowship offered by your esteemed institute would provide an ideal intellectual environment for the advancement of this scholarly endeavor.

My academic trajectory has been consistently centered on Persian literary traditions. My undergraduate thesis focused on Mohsen Nāmju, a contemporary musician and lyricist who draws upon the canonical works of thirteenth- and fourteenth-century Persian poets while engaging with Reżā Barāheni's seminal work, *Xeţāb be parvānehā*. Later, I chose to specialize in Indo-Persian studies. My master's thesis involved a comparative study of the *robā iyāt* section of Zohuri Toršizi's *kolliyāt* (MS 14041, Library of the Iranian Parliament) and Behdārvand's printed edition, leading me to a broader engagement with the Persographic manuscript tradition. This work laid the foundation for my doctoral research on Zohuri's *matnavi* poem *Sāqināme* and, more broadly, on the *sāqināme* as a literary form.


Although the Persographic literary tradition transcends geographical and political boundaries, it remains crucial to engage with Iran as a living, dynamic, and pluralistic reality. As a scholar of Persian literature, I consider collaboration with the academic community in Iran a fundamental priority. In this regard, I deeply admire forward-looking initiatives such as *Iran Namag* and the *Iran Namag Books* series, which foster intellectual exchange and scholarly dialogue. I would be honored to contribute to and learn from this vibrant community of researchers.

It is with great enthusiasm that I recommend PhD Piero Donnini for the fellowship offered by your prestigious institution. I am Associate Professor of Persian Language and Literature at the Ca' Foscari University of Venice, and I had the privilege of mentoring Piero Donnini since the early stages of his academic journey.

Over the years, I have come to appreciate not only his intellectual discipline and steadfast commitment to scholarship but also his independent thinking and his ability to engage critically with complex textual traditions. His academic career has been marked by both in-depth research and originality.

Donnini's doctoral research exemplifies these qualities. His dissertation focuses on the *sāqināme* [book of the cupbearer] genre and on the early-seventeenth century *tadkere Maykhāne*, offering a in-depth analysis of its compositional strategies and shedding light on narrative inconsistencies within the text. His groundbreaking line of research, which traces the appearance of the *sāqināme* composition within the Turcographic literary circles of the late Timurid era, the subsequent literary categorization of the composition by Ottoman literary circles, and the genre's reintegration into the Persographic sphere through the multilingual educated circles of late fifteenth-century Shiraz, brings into focus an issue to which no scholar had hitherto succeeded in providing due recognition. A further major contribution of his work is the first complete Italian translation of the *Sāqināme* by Zohuri Toršizi, a court poet active in the kingdoms of Deccan during the second half sixteenth century.

Donnini is currently preparing a scholarly publication based on his research, and I am convinced that it will introduce innovative perspectives and provide fertile ground for further academic discussion in the field of Persian studies. I firmly believe that by virtue of his methodological rigor and interpretive ability, his book will make a significant and lasting contribution to the discipline.

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I am confident not only in his intellectual capabilities but also in his human qualities, his capacity for dialogue and his professionalism. A fellowship from your institution would not only acknowledge the impressive work he has already undertaken but would also offer him the ideal context to pursue his research further, at a time when his critical approach is seriously developed and mature from a scientific point of view.
