Between Memory and Mythology: Diasporic Pilgrimage in Post-Revolution Iranian Women's

Return Narratives

In our increasingly diasporized world, many people call elsewhere home, and they feel an inexplicable yet intense desire to travel there to see it for themselves. Like pilgrims, diasporic returnees heed the call of nostalgia to re-establish a connection with their lost origins on the level of the imagination by returning to places that represent their past lives. My dissertation looks at four post-revolution Iranian return narratives, Gelareh Asayesh's *Saffron Sky* (1999), Tara Bahrahmpour's *To See and See Again* (1999), Marjane Satrapi's *Persepolis II: The Story of a Return* (2004), and Parnaz Foroutan *Home is A Stranger* (2020) to chart the history of this subgenre vis-a-vis the shifting image of Iran after the Islamic Revolution and 9/11, and understand the potential of returning to sites of return that are imbued with history as a type of diasporic pilgrimage that can transform one's identity.

Iranian women's life writing, which has boomed in the post-9/11 era, reflects an important distinction between narratives of exile and diasporic return, which are portrayed through distinct tropes and genres. While exile is a political status associated with exclusion from and/or the deprivation of ties to the homeland, the term diaspora is both a descriptive category that refers to maintaining communities away from home, and an interpretive framework that challenges nationalistic discourses of fixed origins through the notion of transnationalism. Exilic Iranian women's life narratives, such as prison and human rights writing, are generally written by public figures, who express their first-hand knowledge about the political workings of Iran's regime and their personal experience of imprisonment and/or state intimidation leading up to their exile. However, Iranian women's narratives of return not only reflect a desire to be in Iran, but they also draw on the generative potential of pilgrimage to

establish diasporic identity by: negotiating the self in relation to the image of Iran in the media vis-a-vis their first-hand experiences, negotiating inherited memories against the backdrop of contemporary Iran, and negotiating their hybrid gendered identity in post-revolution Iran. The books under analysis refocus the mainstream image of women's lives after the revolution, which divided Iranian national belonging along gender lines. These narratives are marked by the tendency to recalibrate identity through diasporic pilgrimage, especially with respect to hard-to-reach locations in post-revolution Iran. In portraying Iran as a place of return and tourism, rather than a place of confinement where women only suffer, the narratives at hand ultimately portray it as a place of leisure, opportunity, and growth. My project thus also demonstrates that the rhetoric of diasporic pilgrimage is deployed by Iranian women writers to complicate the image of post-revolution Iran in the Western imagination.
